Urgent Support Avon Outdoor Learning Center Help the Avon OLC raise \$17,000 to keep its doors open and its programming in place! In a cost-cutting measure, the school district has eliminated the funding for this seven-acre resource that served nearly 7,300 young people and their families last year. Its 1840s cabin, trails, and habitats provide hands-on learning and exploration of nature for people of all ages, and a fruit and vegetable garden showcases ways to grow nutritious food inexpensively. Go with the Flow White River to Central Indiana: Get to Know Me! Discover the White River through "Flow: Can you see the river?"—an important art installation by New York artist Mary Miss, commissioned by the <u>Indianapolis Museum of Art</u>. Mary Miss' slogan "All property is riverfront property" expresses a key environmental and social concept of interconnectivity of land, water, and people, that is often overlooked, especially by urban dwellers. Important and unique elements of the White River water system are revealed through a series of installations along the river and the canal. Stopping points, marked with oversized "thumb tacks" and mirrors, engage visitors and increase awareness of the watershed and its role in the life of the city. Opportunity DNR Funds Available for Urban Forestry Indiana Department of Natural Resources has \$120,000 in grant funds available to cities, towns, and non-profits for public tree inventories, urban forestry educational awareness, and tree planting projects. Municipalities and non-profits can request funds ranging from \$2,500 to \$20,000. Projects must show an equal match, which can be a mix of cash and in-kind services. All project trees must be planted on public property, defined as property owned and managed by a local or county government. Apply by November 30. Continuing Education Be a Leader in Watershed Management Sign up now to improve your water quality and watershed management skills at the 2012 Indiana Watershed Leadership Academy. Organized by Purdue University, the program immerses participants in basic and advanced watershed topics such as leadership principles, watershed science, organization and communication, technology and GIS, stakeholder involvement techniques, and policy making. Participants who complete all requirements earn a Purdue University Continuing Education Professional Certificate in Watershed Management. Training includes three face-to-face group sessions and distance learning online (approximately 3-4 hrs/week).
