New Service Leave the Composting to Us Indy's first food waste composting service is up and collecting! MyComposter! takes the work out of composting. It's designed as a small-batch composting service for small commercial food service operations, restaurants, and residences. You scrape your compost materials into their MyComposter! bin, and they pick it up and compost it for you. When the compost is ready, they use it to plant organic vegetable gardens at local schools, community supported agriculture sites, and in distressed areas to promote urban gardening.
