**Check It Out! United States Map Based on Where We Get Our Water** Instead of fighting over water, what if each state's boundaries let it get water from one source? Check out the Watershed States of America. This map shows what America would look like if it followed its watersheds. It's an America designed to use water more efficiently, and reduce state conflicts over water. Made by John Lavey, a land use planner at the <u>Sonoran Institute</u>, the map is inspired by an idea from 19<sup>th</sup>-century adventurer and geologist John Wesley Powell. In 1879, Powell proposed that "as the Western states were brought into the union they be formed around watersheds, rather than arbitrary political boundaries."
