CALL TO ACTION Protect Solar Energy Jobs, Defeat Senate Bill 309 From Hoosier Environmental Council: You have the right to harvest the sunshine on our own property, but this bill would make it illegal. Solar is becoming much more affordable as the price for solar panels drop. The number of solar owners in Indiana has increased 300% in 5 years. And there are over 1 million solar installations countrywide. But SB 309, written by the Utility Lobby, would make home-grown clean energy unaffordable for Hoosiers and kill Indiana's emerging solar sector and jobs. Help us defend your solar rights. SB 309 will be heard Thursday, February 2, in the Senate Utilities Committee at the statehouse. Please contact your state senator before Wed. CALL TO ACTION Support Swamp Milkweed (Asclepias tuberosa) for State Wildflower The Indiana Native Plant and Wildflower Society is mounting a campaign to name Swamp Milkweed as our State Wildflower. It won't replace the State Flower, the Peony (of Asian origin), but will give equal attention to a native plant that's beautiful and good for Monarch butterflies. State senator Vaneta Becker has submitted a bill to that end, SB 470, but she wants to hear a groundswell of support from the public. Please call or write Sen. Becker, Sen.
