CALL TO ACTION Defend Indiana's Solar Incentives! Update from Carmel Green Initiative: Senate Bill 309 passed out of the House Utilities Committee on Wednesday with an 8-5 vote, and moves to a full House vote possibly as early as Monday, April 3rd. If signed into law, SB309 would take away your right to harness the sunshine on your property and get fair credit for energy contributed to the grid. It arbitrarily sets the compensation rate at 1.25 times wholesale, which is significantly below its true market value. Many studies in other states have shown the market value of rooftop solar is often more than retail, 3 to 4 times the wholesale rate. This anti-solar bill effectively shifts the economic benefits of free solar energy away from the free market and gives it exclusively to the monopoly utilities. This is a very bad deal for Hoosiers. What You Can Do: Contact your state representative TODAY and him or her to vote "No" on SB 309. More about this issue

Landscape History Anyone? As landscape historian Jonathan Pliska has documented in his new book, *A Garden for the President: A History of the White House Grounds,* those grounds aren't just the lawns around the nation's most famous home. They're a historic treasure in their own right, shaped by U.S. presidents and their families over the past two centuries to suit their tastes and the times—from John Quincy Adams digging in the dirt to conduct horticulture experiments, to Richard Nixon hosting daughter Tricia's wedding in the Rose Garden, to Michelle Obama creating a kitchen garden. The book is published by the White House Historical Association to mark the 100th anniversary of the National Park Service, which maintains the 18.7-acre property. Pliska traces the site from its birth as a mess of construction rubble to what we see today, based on famed landscape architect Frederick Olmstead Jr.'s thoughtful, judicious guidelines. http://shop.whitehousehistory.org/a-garden-for-the-president
