Wednesday, January 17 Great Plants for Shady Areas You planted wonderful trees to shade your house. Now you are wondering what to plant in the shade for color and texture. Hostas come to mind, good choice! But there are so many more choices. This presentation explores the array of other species that do well in low light: perennials such as bleeding hearts, corydalis, heucheras, lungworts, astilbes, hardy geraniums, and Solomon seals; ferns such as ostrich, Christmas, beech, and Japanese painted; bulbs like caladiums and surprise lilies; and annual impatiens, coleus, and begonias. New Funding Available Grasslands for Gamebirds & Songbirds Indiana DNR's Division of Fish & Wildlife has landed \$1 million from the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to fund a new grassland and pollinator habitat development program that will benefit private landowners. The "Grasslands for Gamebirds & Songbirds" initiative, GGS for short, will employ three full-time "grassland biologists" to provide technical and financial assistance to private landowners seeking to improve their properties by developing grassland and pollinator habitat throughout focal regions of the state. This habitat development will benefit species such as bobwhite quail, ring-necked pheasant, Henslow's sparrow, and loggerhead shrike. "[I]ndiana landowners will receive assistance to install practices such as native grasses, pollinators, prescribed burns, tree plantings, and invasive species control that will increase declining bird populations," said Jane Hardisty, Indiana NRCS's state conservationist.
