Volunteer Opp Hamilton County Invasives Partnership (HIP) Weed Wrangles Green is not always good. Hamilton County landscapes are encountering growing threats from non-native plants. Invasive plants introduced in this region decades ago for landscaping and other purposes are now a serious concern for our parks, public green spaces, and our own backyards. More and more, this counties' beautiful native trees, plants and wildlife are losing the fight against these aggressive plants, vines, trees and insects that consume nutrients, disrupt the ecological balance and disfigure the outdoor world where county residents hike, bike, picnic, play, and relax. To restore balance, the organizations of the Hamilton County Invasives Partnership (HIP) are inviting volunteers to help rescue our public parks from invasive species by participating in Weed Wrangles. During the Weed Wrangle, teams of volunteers, supervised by knowledgeable guides, locate and uproot unwelcome plants such as bush honeysuckle, garlic mustard, autumn olive, English ivy, and winter creeper.
